Greetings, Beloved:

The over-arching theme for December is the liturgical season of Advent, the season of waiting for the fulfillment of the promise of God, the birth of the One who is the Messiah, the Anointed One of God. Yet I recognize that there are aspects of the season of Advent that can be hard for us to live into fully. Beyond the boundaries of our worship services, there is very little in our daily lives that invites us into a time of stillness and anticipatory waiting for the coming of the Christ Child.

Our worship series for Advent is called "The Gift of Being Present." Advent can be filled with worry about finding the perfect Christmas gifts. Deep down we want people in our lives to know they are special and that we love them. But sometimes we overlook the greatest gift of all... our very presence. Our spiritual ancestors were also worried — often about survival in the midst of political occupation. And the response of the scriptures is "do not be afraid, I am with you." Like a shepherd who never leaves the flock, we are held close. In our worship this season, we will be invited to be the gift of presence with hope, peace, joy, and love for our loved ones, for our communities, for those who need it most.

In keeping with the theme of our presence being a present to others, I want to encourage you to invite a family member, a neighbor, a friend to come with you to Sunday worship or another worship or fellowship event at our church during this season of hope-full waiting, watching, and celebration. Besides Sunday morning worship and Social Hour, here are other opportunities to which you could invite someone new to come with you and introduce them to our church:

during this season. We are reminded that we are still surrounded by the compassionate love and God and can experience God's presence for peace and endurance.

Christmas Eve – December 24, 4:30 p.m. (Family Service), 7:00 p.m. (Service of Lessons & Carols) Christmas Day – December 25, 10:00 a.m., Service of Carols and Communion, comfy clothes and pjs welcome

I want to thank you for the ways in this year in which you have lived out your membership vows to support Ebenezer through "your prayers, your presence, your gifts, your service, and your witness." Every one of us is vital to make the ministry and mission of Ebenezer continue to bring hope, vision, growth, and joy into the lives of many - within our church facilities, our local community and throughout the world. Advent I, December 3rd

The word "advent" derives from the Latin "adventus", meaning "coming." During its earliest observances, Advent was 40 days of repentance, fasting and prayer as new believers prepared for their baptisms. Oftentimes, these baptisms took place on the day of Epiphany--which is a day remembering the Magi's visit to baby Jesus; it was a celebration of Jesus' incarnation on Earth.

Later Christians began tying Advent not just to Christ's incarnation, but to an anticipated second coming of Christ. Advent became a period for renewing the anticipation and longing for Jesus' return.

Today, Advent is a period of preparation for both "advents"--or arrivals--of Jesus. Lester Ruth, a professor at Duke Divinity School and a historian of Christian worship, offered this distinction for Advent: "The simplest way I have to distinguish between Advent and Christmas is that advent uses the word "come" as a longing petition, expressed in anticipation, whereas Christmas is a commemorative reflection on how the Lord has come in Christ's birth and thus the trigger for a new redemptive order has begun."

In our culture, the close ties to Christmas seemingly outweigh the anticipation of another "advent" of Jesus. We conflate the Christmas commemoration and the anticipation of Advent. Ignoring this "second coming" removes some of the urgency of our Christian call to enact God's love and justice on Earth.

Our celebration of Advent will include the "Hanging of the Greens" (decorating the church for Christmas). Each week an Advent candle will be lit, marking the time to Christmas.

Lighting of the Advent Wreath

The candles also have their own special significance. The four candles represent the four weeks of Advent, and one candle is lit each Sunday. Three of the candles are purple because the color violet is a liturgical color that signifies a time of prayer, penance, and sacrifice.

- The first candle, which is purple, symbolizes hope. It is sometimes called the "Prophecy Candle" in remembrance of the prophets, especially Isaiah, who foretold the birth of Christ. It represents the expectation felt in anticipation of the coming Messiah.
- The second candle, also purple, represents faith. It is called the "Bethlehem Candle" as a reminder of Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem.
- The third candle is pink and symbolizes joy. It is called the "Shepherd's Candle," and is pink because rose is a liturgical color for joy. The third Sunday of Advent is Gaudete Sunday and is meant to remind us of the joy that the world experienced at the birth of Jesus, as well as the joy that the faithful have reached the midpoint of Advent.
- On the fourth week of Advent, we light the final purple candle to mark the final week of prayer and penance as we wait for the birth of our Savior. This final candle, the "Angel's Candle," symbolizes peace. It reminds us of the message of the angels: "Peace on Earth, Good Will Toward Men."

A white candle is placed in the middle of the wreath; this is a beautiful modern adaptation. The white candle is lit on Christmas Eve. This candle is called the "Christ Candle" and represents the life of Christ. The color white is for purity—because Christ is our sinless, pure Savior.

Greetings from your Health and Wellness Ministry

As promised, all about Type 2 Diabetes What Is Type 2 Diabetes?

Type 2 diabetes is a lifelong disease that keeps your body from using insulin the way it should.

People who are middle-aged or older are most likely to get this kind of diabetes. It used to be called adult-onset diabetes or diabetes mellitus. But type 2 diabetes also affects kids and teens, mainly because of childhood obesity.

Type 2 is the most common form of diabetes. About 1 in 10 people in the U.S. have type 2. Nearly 1 in 3 have prediabetes, meaning their blood sugar (or blood glucose) is high but not high enough to be diabetes yet.

Symptoms of Type 2 Diabetes

The symptoms of type 2 diabetes can be so mild that you don't notice them. About 9 million people have it and don't know it. Symptoms include:

- Being very thirsty
- Increase in urination
- Blurry vision
- Tingling or numbness in your hands or feet
- Fatigue/feeling worn out
- Wounds that don't heal
- Yeast infections that keep coming back
- Feeling hungry
- Weight loss without trying
- Getting infections

If you have dark rashes around your neck or armpits, see your doctor. These are called acanthosis nigricans, and they can be signs that your body is becoming resistant to insulin.

Causes of Type 2 Diabetes

Usually, a combination of things causes type 2 diabetes. They might include:

- Genes. Scientists have found different bits of DNA that affect how your body makes insulin.
- Weight. Having extra weight or obesity can cause insulin resistance.
- Metabolic syndrome. People with insulin resistance often have a group of conditions including high blood sugar, high blood pressure, high cholesterol and triglycerides.
- Too much glucose from your liver. When your blood sugar is low, your liver makes and sends out glucose. After you eat, your blood sugar goes up, and your liver usually slows down and stores its glucose for later. But some people's livers don't. They keep making sugar.
- Bad communication between cells. Sometimes, cells send the wrong signals or don't pick up messages correctly.
 When these problems affect how your cells make and use insulin or glucose, this can lead to diabetes.
- Broken beta cells. If the cells that make insulin send it out at the wrong time, your blood sugar gets thrown off. High blood sugar can damage these cells, too.

Type 2 Diabetes Risk Factors

Certain things make it more likely that you'll get type 2 diabetes. The more of these that apply to you, the higher your chances of getting it are. Some things are related to who you are:

- Age. 45 or older
- Family. A parent, sister, or brother with diabetes
- Ethnicity. African American, Alaska Native, Native American, Asian American, Hispanic or Latino, or Pacific Islander American

Risk factors related to your medical history and health include:

- Insulin resistance
- Prediabetes
- Heart and blood vessel disease
- High blood pressure, even if it's treated and under control.
- Low HDL ("good") cholesterol
- High triglycerides
- Being overweight or having obesity
- Having a baby who weighed more than 9 pounds.
- Gestational diabetes while you were pregnant.
- Polycystic ovary syndrome (PCOS)
- Depression

Other things that raise your risk of diabetes have to do with your daily habits and lifestyle. These are the ones you can do something about:

- Getting little or no exercise
- Smoking
- Stress
- Sleeping too little or too much

Type 2 diabetes epidemiology

Some 462 million people worldwide, or about 6.3% of the population, have type 2 diabetes. It's the ninth leading cause of death, responsible for more than 1 million deaths each year. Cases of type 2 diabetes are increasing faster in developed countries like the U.S. and Western Europe.

Scientists say type 2 diabetes affects men and women at about the same rate.

It's more common in people in middle age and older, affecting:

- 4.4% of those ages 15-49
- 15% of those ages 50-69
- 22% of those 70 and older

It's also more common in people of color, including those whose heritage is:

- Black
- Hispanic
- Native American
- Asian

Type 2 Diabetes Diagnosis and Tests

Your doctor can test your blood for signs of type 2 diabetes. Usually, they'll test you on 2 different days to confirm the diagnosis. But if your blood glucose is very high or you have many symptoms, one test may be all you need.

Blood tests for type 2 diabetes include:

- A1c. It's the average percent of your blood glucose over the past 2 or 3 months.
- Fasting plasma glucose. This is also known as a fasting blood sugar test. It measures your blood sugar on an empty stomach. You won't be able to eat or drink anything except water for 8 hours before the test.
- Oral glucose tolerance test (OGTT). This checks your blood glucose before and 2 hours after you drink something sweet to see how your body handles the sugar.

Stages of Type 2 Diabetes

Researchers have defined four stages of type 2 diabetes:

Insulin resistance

In this stage, your body usually makes enough insulin to keep blood sugar levels in the normal range. But if your cells "resist" the insulin (don't use it correctly), your body will make more insulin to try to help the glucose get into them. Insulin resistance can be temporary, but it can also last. There's no test to detect insulin resistance, so it can be hard to diagnose.

Prediabetes

Eventually, insulin resistance causes glucose to build up in your blood. You have prediabetes when your blood sugar levels are higher than normal, but not high enough to be considered diabetes. An A1c between 5.7% and 6.4% means you have prediabetes. You may not have any symptoms. But prediabetes increases your risk for heart disease, stroke, and type 2 diabetes.

Type 2 diabetes

If your A1c is 6.5% or higher, you will have diabetes. You may have symptoms like increased thirst, blurred vision, and numbness in feet or hands. Or you may not have any symptoms at all.

Type 2 diabetes with vascular complications

At this stage, your diabetes has led to vascular (blood vessel) problems. You may have damage to vessels in your eyes (retinopathy), kidneys (nephropathy), and certain nerves (neuropathy). You might also develop heart disease, stroke, or circulation issues.

Type 2 Diabetes Treatment

Managing type 2 diabetes includes a mix of lifestyle changes and medication.

Lifestyle changes

You may be able to reach your target blood sugar levels with diet and exercise alone.

Weight loss. Dropping extra pounds can help. While losing 5% of your body weight is good, losing at least 7% and keeping it off seems to be ideal. That means someone who weighs 180 pounds can change their blood sugar levels by losing around 13 pounds. Weight loss can seem overwhelming, but portion control and eating healthy foods are a good place to start.

Healthy eating. There's no specific diet for type 2 diabetes. A registered dietitian can teach you about carbs and help you make a meal plan you can stick with. Focus on:

- Eating fewer calories
- Cutting back on refined carbs, especially sweets
- Adding veggies and fruits to your diet
- Getting more fiber
- Exercise. Try to get 30 to 60 minutes of physical activity every day. You can walk, bike, swim, or do anything else that gets your heart rate up. Pair that with strength training, like yoga or weightlifting. If you take a medication that lowers your blood sugar, you might need a snack before a workout.
- Watch your blood sugar levels. Depending on your treatment, especially if you're on insulin, your doctor will tell you if you need to test your blood sugar levels and how often to do it.


