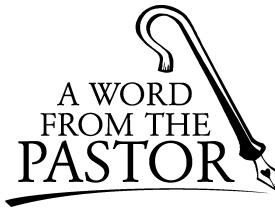

Greetings in the New Year, Beloved:

It feels like I should be starting off this article with Happy New Year! since it is the first article I've written in 2026. But, it's the middle of February and we are eagerly awaiting the coming of Spring after the extended period of severely cold weather we've had recently.

This is also the first article of my swan song time at Ebenezer with my approaching retirement date of June 30, 2026. When that day comes, I will have served as your pastor for nine years and 10 months, the longest appointment of my ministry. For me it has been an incredible journey of learning and growth, laughter and tears, joys and sorrows. I have found many wonderful, caring relationships with the community that is Ebenezer. It has been my privilege and joy to walk with you in your journeys of life which have also included times of joy and times of sorrow.

Making the decision to retire after a time of prayerful reflection and discussions with Rick and my family was the right decision. Yet it is a bittersweet decision. I have loved my time serving God's kingdom with you. And though it is not a responsibility of mine, after making the decision to retire and informing the Staff Parish Relations Committee (SPRC), I began praying for the person whom our Bishop would appoint as the pastor to succeed me. That process begins with a conversation between the District Superintendent and the members of the church's SPRC. From that conversation, the church's Charge Conference reports from previous years, and the church's Church Profile form from previous years, the District Superintendent carries information to the Bishop and the Cabinet (District Superintendents from the Peninsula-Delaware and Baltimore Washington Conferences) where prayer, conversation, and discernment takes place over a



period of time leading to the decision by the Bishop as to the person who will be appointed to fill the church's pulpit.

I was blessed to hear the announcement of your new pastor, Rev. Tracy Mooney, on February 1 at the same time you did. I can say that I was very thankful to God for the discernment and wisdom with which the selection of Rev. Mooney was made by our Bishop Latrelle Miller Easterling. I have known Tracy for nearly all my time in ministry and our paths have crossed many times. She is a delightful person, with a strong faith, and devoted to following Jesus. She has a heart for missions and a sincere desire to be a strong pastoral leader. She is very much looking forward to beginning her time in July as your pastor. I know you will welcome her with the same caring friendliness with which you welcomed me and with which you have continued to bless Rick and I during our years at Ebenezer.

When I leave Ebenezer at the end of June, I will be taking with me a hugely long list of acts of kindness, generosity of spirit, heartfelt prayers, and times of deep fellowship that has led me to countless prayers of thanksgiving and gratitude. I pray that I have brought to you an understanding of how precious you are to God, how gifted and graced you are to serve God's kingdom, and perhaps helped you deepen your faith and trust in Jesus as your Savior and Lord.

The next 4 months will fly by but there are still opportunities to double joys and halve sorrows through shared times of worship and fellowship together. I hope you are looking forward to it. I know I am.

Why Did Jesus Have to Die?

Despite the crucifixion's central place in Christian faith, the New Testament offers few clear answers about how Jesus' death saves, or why, exactly, he had to die. The New Testament writers use a host of metaphors—ransom, sacrifice, reconciliation, victory—but never explain exactly how it works or why it had to happen this way.

What if that's because we've been asking the wrong question? What if the cross isn't a transaction to be explained, but a living Word from God meant to transform who we are and how we live?

4. Call 911 and follow the directions the dispatcher gives you.

Now some info on diabetes

American Diabetes Association Diabetes Alert Day[®] is on March 22, 2022! Observed annually on the fourth Tuesday in March, Diabetes Alert Day is a one-day “wake-up call” that focuses on the seriousness of diabetes and the importance of understanding your risk. We encourage you to find out if you—or someone you love—is at risk for type 2 diabetes by taking this quick and simple Diabetes Risk Test.

Did You Know?

- Diabetes affects about 34.2 million Americans or about 10.5 percent of the U.S. population.
- Nearly 1 in 5 adults living with diabetes, or 7.3 million Americans, are unaware that they have the disease.
- Approximately 88 million people aged 18 years or older have prediabetes, a condition in which blood glucose levels are higher than normal, but not high enough to be diagnosed as diabetes.
- More than 84 percent of people living with prediabetes don’t know they have it.
- About 50 percent of women with gestational diabetes go on to develop type 2 diabetes. Gestational diabetes is a type of diabetes that women develop when they are pregnant.

Understand Your Risk

The sooner you know you’re at risk, the sooner you can take steps to prevent or manage diabetes. If you have a family history of diabetes, you have a greater chance of developing type 2 diabetes. You are also more likely to develop type 2 diabetes if you are over age 45, are overweight, or are not physically active.

Are You at Risk for Type 2 Diabetes? Diabetes Risk Test One in four Americans with diabetes is undiagnosed. Could you be one of the 8 million Americans who has diabetes and doesn’t know it? Take the test and learn more about your risk for getting type 2 diabetes.

Add up Your Score

The higher your score, the higher your risk. If you scored 5 or more: You are at increased risk for having type 2 diabetes. Talk to your health care provider about simple blood tests to check for diabetes or prediabetes. Early diagnosis and treatment can prevent or delay heart attack, stroke, blindness, kidney disease, and other health problems.

If you scored below 5: Even if your score was below 5, you may be at increased risk for having prediabetes—blood sugar levels that are higher than normal but not high enough to be called diabetes.

The good news for people with prediabetes is that you can lower your risk for type 2 diabetes. Talk to your health care team about getting tested, particularly if you are over 45, overweight, or have a family member with diabetes. Find out about the small steps you can take to prevent or delay type 2 diabetes and live a long and healthy life. Type 2 diabetes is more common in African Americans and people with African ancestry, Hispanics and Latinos, American Indians, Alaska Natives, Asian Americans, Native Hawaiians, and Pacific Islanders.

Construction on the new shelter has been progressing well. When this picture was taken in December, they had completed the roof, installed windows, conducted major sitework ensuring adequate water and electrical supply, and were installing siding and making the facility watertight. During the cold weather, they moved to indoor work; including tasks such as wiring, plumbing, installing insulation, drywall, etc. At the current pace, the new facility will likely be open by Spring/Summer.

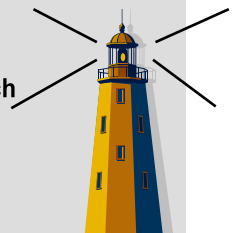

The King No One Expected

Sometimes we speak—or even shout—the truth without realizing just how right we are. That’s exactly what happened on the first Palm Sunday.

Jesus entered Jerusalem not on a prize-worthy stallion, but on a young, humble donkey. The crowd erupted in joy, shouting, “*Hosanna! Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord!*” They waved palm branches, symbols of peace, and hailed Jesus as their king.

Was He a king? Jesus didn’t deny it. When the Pharisees told him to silence the crowd, he replied, “*I tell you, if they keep quiet, the stones will cry out.*”

Later, Pilate—the Roman governor—mocked the religious leaders by saying, “*Here is your king.*” The chief priests bristled with anger, shouting, “*We have no king but Caesar!*”

When Pilate handed Jesus over to be crucified, he made one last jab at the furious crowd. John 19:19 tells us he ordered a sign to be placed above the cross. Written in Hebrew, Latin, and Greek, it declared:

“Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews.”

The chief priests demanded the sign be changed, but Pilate refused. “*What I have written, I have written,*” he said.

Was Jesus a king? The witnesses of His resurrection knew the answer. In Acts 17:7, the early believers were accused of “saying there is another king, Jesus.” And the book of Revelation looks ahead to the day when all creation will know the truth:

“The Lamb will triumph ... for He is Lord of lords and King of kings.” — *Revelation 17:14*



These cheerful "palm trees" make a bright reminder of the celebration that greeted Jesus as he entered Jerusalem.

What you need:

- Bananas (for the tree trunks)
- Kiwis or green grapes (for the palm leaves)
- Mandarin oranges (for the ground)



What you do:

1. Slice bananas in half lengthwise and place vertically on a plate.
2. Arrange kiwi slices or grapes at the top to form palm fronds.
3. Add oranges at the base.
4. Serve immediately or chill until ready to serve.

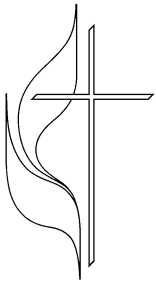
